





Bill Cook was the recipient of the Soroptimist Foundation Citizenship Award this year, which is given for outstanding citizenship and academics in Oklahoma.







The first State Wrestling Champ of NHS was Bud McDaniel. Ricky Kersey was an all-time record breaker in basketball with 1153 points.


